



## Meridian High School / Whatcom Community College Course and Credit Equivalency Guide

For students in Running Start Fall 2018 and beyond

**CREDIT EQUIVALENCIES** - Each class taken at Whatcom Community College (WCC) will be applied at Meridian High School based on the following equivalency chart:

<p><b>Mathematics</b></p>	<p>MATH - Any math course 100 level or above MATH 99**</p>	<p>** MATH 99 is not funded by the Running Start program. Please check with you counselor to determine if high school credit can be awarded.</p>								
<p><b>Fine Arts</b></p>	<p>Any 100 level or above ART, DRAMA, MUSIC that is a performance class</p>	<p>Performance class notes with a (P) in course catalog. 2nd (II) and 3rd level (III) classes that follow a first level (I) class that has a (P) are also approved.</p>								
<p><b>Physical Education</b></p>	<p>All PHYSICAL ED. classes that are activity based courses DANCE 101, 102, 103 – Modern Dance I, II, III</p>	<p>Students may take any combination of PE or Dance classes that will total 3 or 5 WCC credits. Other PE courses can be used as electives.</p>

<b>Science</b>	Any <b>Lab</b> science 100 level or above:  <b>Biology<sup>^</sup>, Chemistry<sup>^</sup>, Geology, Oceanography, Physical Science, Physics<sup>^</sup></b>  Other science class options:  ANTH 205 – Biological Anthropology ASTRONOMY 100 – Survey of Astronomy ENVR. SCIENCE 100 – Survey of Environmental Science MA 112 – Basic Anatomy, Physiology and Pathology MEDICAL ASSISTING 136&137 – Pharmacology (& lab) NUTRITION 101 - Nutrition	<b>Students need 2.0 HS credit in lab science to graduate.</b>  Additionally, at least one algebra-based science course is required for admission to a Washington university. Consult the WCC catalog for lab science designation and algebra prerequisite.  <sup>^</sup> - A student can take a 200 level class in a subject area where they earned high school credit. Students cannot take a 100 level course if they earned high school credit in that same area.

<b>World Language</b>	Any 121 level or above class in the following languages: ASL, French, German, Japanese, Spanish	Students take two consecutive quarters of language at WCC, or combine a high school language course with the next level of the same language at WCC.  To meet the graduation requirement, complete through the <u>second</u> year of a language, or through the <u>122</u> level at WCC.
<b>Electives</b>	Any 100 level and above course	

Students can also take WCC classes to make up courses either failed or not taken in 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grade

<b>Health</b>	PE 181 – Health and Wellness	
<b>9<sup>th</sup>/10<sup>th</sup> Grade English</b> A student who needs to make up: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• .5 HS credit can take a 3 credit or 5 credit WCC course to meet the graduation requirement.</li> <li>• 1.0 HS credit can take two 3 credit or one 5 credit WCC course to meet the graduation requirement.</li> </ul>	Same courses as listed in 11 <sup>th</sup> and 12 <sup>th</sup> grade English are eligible.  The same WCC course may NOT be used to meet high school English graduation requirements.  If a student needs to make up more than 1.0 credit from 9 <sup>th</sup> and 10 <sup>th</sup> grade English, they will need to develop a plan with their high school counselor.  ESLA classes may be used for graduation credit for students who are currently being served by our EL program. If you are in the EL program please talk to your counselor about options.	
<b>Mathematics</b>	MATH - Any math course 100 level or above MATH 98*** and MATH 99***	*** MATH 98 & MATH 99 are not funded by the Running Start program. Please check with your counselor to determine if high school credit can be awarded.
